### **QUOTA EXCHANGE**

The market-clearing price established for the May, 2012 Quota Exchange was \$31,250.00

The next Quota Exchange will be held on June 15, 2012. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be received at the SaskMilk office by midnight, June 6, 2012. SaskMilk recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corrections, if necessary.

Just a reminder to producers that when making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase.

The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following Table.

**LOWER COMPONENT PRICES – APRIL, 2012**

April, 2012 component prices were down compared to previous months.

The Saskatoon plant processed approximately 6.8 million litres of milk into 4m (animal feed) permits in April. SaskMilk requested and received an advance of \$1,049,972 on April pooling results from the Canadian Dairy Commission. This advance increased the average butterfat blend price producers' received from \$17.96 to \$19.37.

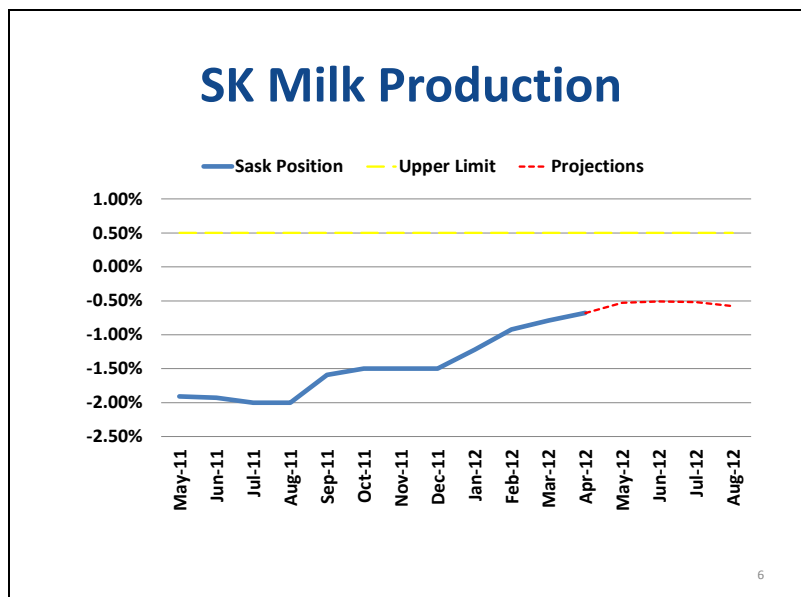
SaskMilk anticipates component prices will be back to normal for the May month-end payment.

In April, Saskatchewan had a monthly CDC allocation of **735,251 kilograms** of butterfat. In the month of April, Saskatchewan production was **9,273 kilograms** of butterfat **over** and cumulatively **under** by -61,708 **kilograms** of butterfat. On a percentage basis, Saskatchewan is at **-0.68%** within our CDC allocation flexibility limits based on the Continuous Quota model. The -1.50% lower flexibility limit is in effect.

## **PROVINCIAL POOLED TRANSPORTATION RATE CHANGE**

The SaskMilk Board of Directors recently reviewed the Saskatchewan operations financial report of Agrifoods International Cooperative Ltd. for the 6 month period ending December, 2011. An increase in the volumes being shipped has resulted in an increase in revenues for Agrifoods creating a surplus over agreed rate of return.

Agrifoods requested a rate decrease of 3.5%. Following a review of these rates, SaskMilk approved a rate decrease of 3.5%, to be applied to the provincial pooled haulage rate. The rate decrease will be applied April, 2012 and will be effective for a 6 month period. Monthly fluctuations may still occur depending on the rate of the fuel surcharge.

## **SASKATCHEWAN MOVING TO A FULLY POOLED PRODUCER TRANSPORTATION RATE**

In the Fall of 2011, the SaskMilk Board of Directors established a Task Force of dairy producers to examine the current transportation cost pooling policy. The guiding principles for policy review were:

- *Equity and Fairness with no significant financial harm to any individual*
- *Desire for a diverse industry, both producers and processors located throughout the province*
- *A policy that would be farm size or farm location neutral, within existing milk routes*
- *Transparency in understanding the haulage system true costs*
- *A transparent, clearly understood policy by all members.*

Over a number of months, the Task Force carefully examined the current method of cost-sharing milk transportation costs amongst producers and presented a report to the SaskMilk Board of Directors in March, 2012. After careful consideration of the options presented by the Task Force, the SaskMilk Board took out a proposal to the spring 2012 producer meetings to receive feedback. Specifically, producers were asked if it was time for Saskatchewan to pool all transportation costs equally among all producers, based on milk volume shipped.

The SaskMilk Board had concluded that a single or pooled rate system without stop fees and without a volume discount most closely fit the identified guiding principles and represented the most equitable and fair solution for all members regardless of where they are located within the province and regardless of farm size. The single rate or pooled system sets the stage for every member to share in the benefits that arise from additional processing capacity within the province.

Feedback on the proposal at producer meetings was positive, with the general sense that it was time for Saskatchewan to move to a single rate system.

After considering the feedback from producers, the Board will be implementing a single-rate transportation cost pooling system effective August 1, 2012. The revised policy document will be distributed to producers in June.

**RESEARCH REPORT MAY, 2012 – Jack Ford**

I hope that spring work is proceeding well for all of you. Our research project is moving along at a good pace now. I recently talked with the site construction manager and he informed me that for now the construction is running 2 to 3 weeks ahead of schedule. The picture below is of the Metabolic Wing and was either taken by Dave Christensen or Matt Walpole (grad student). Dave and Matt send us new pictures each week which are very much appreciated!

The Dairy Advisory Board held its second meeting recently to discuss a number of topics. Most notably were the talks around including more commodity groups around the table and acceptance of a number of proposed future projects. SaskMilk becomes the lead sponsor on the majority of the dairy related projects. Our role is to be the industry component for any project that is requesting federal funding and industry must always take the lead role. Much of this funding is through the Federal Government CAAP funding which is administered provincially by the Agriculture Council of Saskatchewan (ACS). This is a system that has worked very well for several years because the research people in our province are able to talk directly with the ACS people and when an application comes forward and there are any unanswered questions or concerns, the ACS people can seek out their answer very quickly and efficiently. The reason I have gone into this long winded explanation is because when the Federal Government brought down their new budget recently, there were several cuts identified, one of them being the research mechanism. ACS will no longer be administering CAAP funding applications after 2014, the same can be said about the other provinces as well. The Federal Government will require all future applications to be dealt with by Ottawa. In my mind we had fourteen very efficient groups handling the funding in fourteen very distinct regions of Canada. How can we expect an over worked office in Ottawa to be as efficient and as understanding of each province's needs as what we have now?

The planning around the gallery components is well underway. We were successful in having our partners (the University) include several of our industry partners in the planning stage. SaskCanola, SaskFlax, Agriculture in the Classroom, 4H, and the Western Grains Research Fund were all present. We hope that the focus of the gallery will be “from field to table” to show our future visitors how much effort the Canadian farmer puts into delivering a safe and wholesome product to the consumer table, no matter where they live, be it in Canada or somewhere else in the world.
